Because of that, I wrote four picture book manuscripts and I am within a few chapters of completing my first middle grade manuscript. I never set goals to attend the conferences or write the manuscripts, or teach the creative writing classes, but they happened because I pushed myself out of my comfort zone. And, looking at what I DID, brings the most important into focus, while the DIDN'Ts faded away and stopped discouraging me.

If you're in a similar place, take some time to write down what you DID accomplish. Focus on what got you there and how those accomplishments turned into actions that caused new, exciting successes to happen. Bring the DIDs into focus and congratulate yourself on an amazing, triumphant year.

By focusing on what we DID, it will be easier to look forward to all the wonderful, yet unknown, successes coming in 2018. Happy Holidays!

Members Meeting 18th November 2017

Katya Cengal gave an entertaining and illuminating talk on "How to Fund and Publish your Work." For most of us the question of funding does not arise as a significant problem; pen and ink and perhaps some computer disk space are not so very expensive. Cengal, however, travels internationally and performs research on the topics she intends to cover with her writing. She needs front money, and told us how to find it from lessconventional sources than the traditional publishers and newspapers. Her favorites are grants from educational presses and from interested organizations. These have taken her from her base in the Central Coast of California to places as widespread as Cambodia, Mozambique and the 'Flyover States' to prepare stories on subjects as diverse as minor league baseball, elephants, and always with human interest.

She starts with a good proposed subject [which might change as events unfold] and a well-prepared, brief but highly-focused pitch to offer to carefully-selected publishers and sponsors; always remembering that the sponsor wants credit for the final work, and to get that credit the work must eventually be published. Established credentials help! Prior research into these publishers and sponsors is equally as important as the final article or book.

The combination of topic selection, customer research, planning and preparation, flexibility – and don't forget writing talent – has enabled Cengal to make a living from travel and writing and build a considerable reputation as a human-interest journalist and author. She sets an enviable example for us all.
