The Creative and Restorative Power of Journaling Dennis VanderWerff

As a middle-aged man living in the “Paris of the Mind,” I am passionate about the creative and restorative power of journaling. Through journaling for nearly thirty years, I’ve learned that I am the main character of my own unique life script. All of the stories (novels, plays, screen plays, poems) I will ever write already live inside me.

Most of us follow and, indeed, accept without question, the scripts given to us by parents, teachers, society; scripts based on the themes, values, and myths of those who gave them to us. What we fail often to understand is our potential to re-frame, reshape and change our scripts to change our lives. How does one figure out whose script it is we are living? Journaling about the stories that

shape my identity give me insight into my life script and provide clarity about what changes can or must be made to live my life more fully and authentically.

I’ll talk about various journaling techniques and provide a short bibliography of books and articles on journaling as well as journaling resources.

Before Dr. Wall was invited by Oprah to do her show, a story about the project appeared in *The Bakersfield Californian*. His books were selling briskly during the break and after the meeting ended. For any writer seeking inspiration, and the charge to write that book this was the meeting to attend.

Writers Getting Ink

This is a fun column to write, even more fun when an enthusiastic WOKian does the work for me. So, if you “Get Ink,” or know someone who does, let us know. Every success inspires the rest of us.

Caroline Reid was mentioned at the last meeting for her entries at The Kern County Fair. She dropped me a note to clarify. “Terry, I don’t remember what year, but I think two years ago, I won a first place ribbon for I Want to be a Policeman, about my son who was policeman. This year it was third place for His Music Fills My Soul, about my grandpa and his violin. No money, no trips, one ribbon (first place).”

Joan Raymond struck gold more than once over the past month. “I was/will be published three times in The Taft Independent. These include “Buttonwillow Family Farm Day,”

an interview with Lawrence Paik of Paik’s Ranch House Restaurant, and a story about a young Taft resident who volunteered for the Army, Timothy Casteel. I interviewed the Taft College librarian, Terri Smith, and will be doing a huge article on the Historic Fort in Taft.

I was published mid-September in The Penman Review, my Southern New Hampshire University online literary review for a non-fiction resource article about interviewing people for my newspaper freelance position. In October I will be published (again) in The Penman Review for my fiction story “Appleseed Creek Neighborhood Watch.”

I have an article in the October issue of Res Ipsa Loquitur, the Kern County Bar Association magazine, for my coverage of David Wolf’s presentation to Writers of Kern in July. Also, in case that’s not be enough, I won 2nd place in a student sponsored writing contest with my college (SNHU Writers Group.)”

Annis Cassells wrote to say, “My story, “You Should Get Married” took 3rd place in the Inland Empire Branch’s writing contest. There’s a \$50 prize and they asked if they could publish the story in their newsletter, Fresh Ink. This is my first time winning anything in a writing contest. Yahooooo!”
