Her topic is "Rx for Writeritis," or, "Remedies for Literary Ailments." She'll be offering ideas on how to fix the "health" problems that often arise in a writer's world. For instance, what to do when you seriously *don't want* to write (literary depression); how to break through writer's block (literary helplessness); why writers shouldn't over-pressure themselves (high word pressure); and how we give ourselves literary laryngitis. Sounds like just the thing to deliver us from possible, or lurking, winter-writing doldrums.

Delia Latham is a born-and-bred Californian, currently living in Tehachapi with her husband Johnny and a spoiled Pomeranian. Delia writes inspirational romance that almost always includes a touch of the divine in the form of angels or angelic activity, thus her *tagline of "Heaven's touch in earthly tales."*

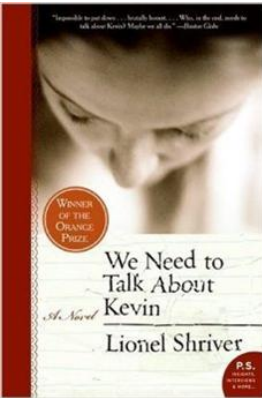

Book Review
We Need to Talk About Kevin by Lionel Shriver
Anna Stewart

Kevin Khatchadourian is a murderer. His mother, Eva, takes the bus to visit him in prison on Saturdays. It is never pleasant. After all, she has never much liked him. Still, her life is consumed by Kevin, by the horror of what he has done. The child she didn't really want, the child that never loved her, the child that never did anything a normal child should do has grown up to be a monster. Did she birth a monster? Or did she make one? And can she love it?



In a series of letters to her husband, Eva explores these questions, telling her story in plain and

unflattering terms. Her story is a mix of her own indifference toward Kevin, her resentments toward motherhood and her increasing awareness of Kevin's oddities, his cruelties and his indifference toward other people, toward life. If you're

looking for a light read, look elsewhere. It took me a while to get into the epistolary style of the book, a little longer to warm to a sometimes unsympathetic and perhaps unreliable narrator, but I found the book well worth the effort, troubling for the questions it asks with an ending that nonetheless offers hope of redemption for both Eva and her son. I enjoyed it.

There is a movie. I did not like it. Read the book instead.
