6th Annual Spring Conference is a hit



“Is the agent here yet?” Dave Congalton asked, referring to the next speaker, Toni Lopopolo. “When she comes, mob her.” His point? Make connections with people who could potentially help us -- one of his “rules of the road” of a writer’s journey.

WOKians and visitors arrived early at the 6th Annual Spring Conference. Purposeful volunteers prepared for setup. Excited member authors displayed their books. Eager participants mingled with fellow writers over an abundant continental breakfast. We filled the meeting hall and overflowed into the conference room for registration and book sales. The four speakers inspired, taught, coached, amused, reminded, and encouraged. Each, in their own way, connected with the audience of sixty.

In addition to teaching us the difference between “blond” and “blonde,” Toni Lopopolo told us what publishers are buying now: non-fiction (women and health), narrative non-fiction, memoir, and “cozies, feel good stories, containing no blood and guts.”

Allison Crotzer Kimmel put us through several writing exercises that help develop strong characters, making us look at protagonists and antagonists with more depth.

“Don’t spend a lot of time waiting to start. Just get in as fast as you can.” Herb Benham advised, “Put notes and outlines away and go with whatever comes to mind. The first couple of paragraphs are usually thrown out.”

Evaluations showed our fabulous foursome struck a chord with participants.

“Very inspirational talk, useful for a neophyte writer like myself!” “Great handout on a writer’s journey.”

“What super tips! Thank you! Very useful information -- I’m going back home to edit my writing.”

“Thank you for the writing exercises -- gave me a start on a book I have been thinking about.”

“Very funny. Very insightful. Showing how life can produce so many stories.”

Thanks to the board members and volunteers who put this stellar event together. With attendees’ suggestions and comments in mind, the conference planning committee has already begun the ground work for making the 2016 Spring Conference even more successful.

My Mom won the battle but lost the war. She finally out-prayed her myriad of friends. They would come to visit her in the nursing home and always leave by telling her, "I'm praying for you, Dorothy." They just didn't understand that Dorothy had her own prayer, "I'm ready, Lord, please let it be tonight. Just let me close my eyes for the last time. Please."

Her final prayer was answered yesterday morning. She didn't have to open her weak eyes that could only see three or four feet in front of her. She didn't have to have help getting into her wheel chair because her legs had stopped working. She didn't have to depend on anyone for anything anymore. And she finally didn't have to question why her prayers were going unanswered.

Just 29 days before her 100th birthday, Dorothy, my Mom, proved me wrong. I had been telling people she was immortal. I thought she was. She was the strongest one hundred pound ball of fire I ever knew.

We each are unique. Our lives have been incredible adventures filled with great times, shitty times, hard times, fun times and just getting by. My mom led a simple life, but her uniqueness was special.

She did stuff for people. All the time. She tried to make life easier for everyone she knew. She sent cards...Christmas cards, Easter cards, Thanksgiving cards, birthday cards, anniversary cards, get well cards and sympathy cards. Hallmark should send her a card, she helped them succeed.


She loved my Dad. My Dad loved her. They were married 63 years till Dad passed in '01.
