

I've started this column three different times and deleted my progress each time. The right words weren't coming. This has been a rough week. Beginning with the tragic shooting in Las Vegas to the death of Tom Petty. Then as I tried to avoid Facebook, I saw my long-time friend Vicki post that her mother had passed away. Vicki and I have been friends for 50 years, her mom was like my second mom. I was numb, and sad, and I couldn't find the words to express my grief. She posted the funeral would be Friday, October 6, at a Catholic church in Fresno. And then it hit me. Friday, the 6th was also the 39th anniversary of my own mother's passing. I finally realized why everything hit me so hard.

Vicki and I met in 4th grade. Both of us started in April, a few months before the end of that school year because our fathers had transferred to Fresno from other cities. We became close friends, and until we graduated from 8th grade, Vicki and I spent almost every Friday night at one of our houses. We played Scrabble (she always won), made cookies from those big refrigerated cookie dough packages, played Heart and Soul on the piano, and we wrote. Over those four years we wrote a radio play "Dead Cooks Tell No Tales." We wrote parodies of the 11:00 news shows. And we wrote a lot of stories. After we wrote them, we read and recorded them on cassette tapes – many of which I still have! She also snuck a peek at my diary and told the entire 8th grade class about my crush on one of our classmates. But I forgave her, and because of our friendship and shared love of writing, I continued on the writing path.

As much as I tried to write a different president's message, this is the one that wanted to be written. It would seem that over the years I'd know enough to let the words flow



Using Metaphors to Open Doors: Strategy and Technique for Poetry and Prose

Are you interested in taking your writing up a notch? Honing the craft often comes with discovery and practice of different ideas and techniques. This month, poet and CSU Bakersfield educator Matthew Woodman will discuss strategies for implementing metaphors to provide structure and deepen meaning. “We will examine how authors have constructed effective metaphors in both poetry and prose, and we will brainstorm ways we can use metaphor in similar ways in our own writing,” he said.

Woodman is an often-published poet who uses metaphor as a tenet of his own work. And though we often think of such devices as “for poetry,” he will show how metaphors can help expand the range of meaning in any given literary work. Attendees will learn the elements of an effective metaphor and how to apply these elements to their own writing.

Young Writers of Kern Call for Volunteers

The Young Writers of Kern writing competition for 2018 will be starting soon. Our mission statement is: To cultivate successful writers and critical thinkers among middle and high school students. The topic for 2018 will be “What does it mean to be responsible members of US society?”

In the meantime, we need everyone's help with fundraising (among other things). Would you like to be on the fundraising committee? We'll be soliciting donations from members and others to fund the prizes and the dinners for students and their parents. \$20 buys a student dinner; \$40 buys two student dinners, or one student and one parent; \$60 buys one student and two parents; \$150 funds a junior high/middle school award; \$200 funds a high school award. And, of course, if none of those amounts quite suits you, you can give whatever amount you wish and designate the purpose (e.g., \$100 for 5 dinners). Our fundraising goal is \$5,000, so we're looking for grants as well as single donations. We've got lots of ideas, but we need a committee to follow through and confirm donations. Please let Joan or Martha Jarrett know at the next meeting if you can help.

September Meeting Report

At the regular Members meeting on 16th September we were treated to a lively interactive talk by Warren Pechin on conducting research for a non-fiction book. As an architect Warren is uniquely well-placed to write about the older buildings in Bakersfield and the web of history surrounding each one. The importance of researching settings, and of sticking to places you know, gives you credibility with your readers; so take care to finish your homework!

Bakersfield has lots of history. Early visitors included Kit Carson, Colonels Fremont and Baker, General Beale and, of course, Father Garces early in his travels through the South West in 1776. Yet the number of buildings listed for historic preservation in Bakersfield is only fourteen; Fresno boasts two hundred and eighty three. Some of this is explained by the massive earthquake of 1952 and the two big fires of 1888 and 1893.

Warren's own book is thoughtfully laid out, with a separate volume for the full-page illustrations. This allows the reader to have text and associated pictures open simultaneously and side by side, no need to cross-refer back and forth as you follow the history. This meticulous forethought and attention to detail is what makes a good book great.
