REBECCA LANGSTON-GEORGE



An action-packed graphic novel about Virginia Hall, known as one of the most courageous spies of World War II. In the early 1940s, during World War II, Germany's Nazi regime expanded into neighboring European countries, committing horrific crimes against Jewish people and other groups. Enter: Virginia Hall. Born on a small Maryland farm, this brilliant woman's worldly ambitions led her to a clerical position at the U.S. embassy in Warsaw, Poland. While there, a hunting accident caused Hall to lose her leg. After being fitted with a wooden prosthetic leg, she persevered in her work. Hall soon became a spy for Allied forces, serving behind enemy lines in France. With cleverness and courage, Hall, who the Nazis nicknamed the "Limping Lady," eventually became one of the Allies' greatest assets and one the German Gestapo's most feared spies.



CRITIQUE GROUPS

CRITIQUE GROUPS - WHAT'S IN IT FOR ME?

Writers of Kern offers its members the opportunity to join a Critique Group specializing in many genres such as **Poetry, Mystery, Romance, Young Adult, Children's, Screenplays, and SciFi**. Now is the time to join a group that interests you!

The word "Critique Group" may give you horrible shivers, reminding you of the day your 3rd-grade teacher handed back your short story about what you did that summer - covered in red ink noticing every misspelled word. Who needs criticism like that?

WOK Critique Groups are far removed from this punitive experience as possible! The best way I can describe what one is like is to imagine you're sitting at a back table at Dagny's with your closest friends on a Friday afternoon, sharing something momentous or humorous that happened to you. Your friends laugh and offer suggestions about what you might do now - and you know that no matter what you say, they will still love you!

Critique groups offer even more than just a place of camaraderie - they offer a surefire way to improve your writing. When I read my poem to my Poetry Critique Group, each member tells me what they liked about the poem - if there was some cool alteration or rhyme - or a meaningful message. Then one member may ask me, "I wasn't sure what you meant when you wrote 'the green monster' Perhaps 'dragon' might give the reader a better visual?" These are the really valuable moments - because if one person has a question about what you've written, you can bet other folks will too. I jot down the question and promise myself I will try to rework that line. And if a member says, "If this was my poem, I might try a vermillion witch" - I jot down that idea, too.

But what if you don't agree with someone's comment? What if you like your work just the way it is?

That's fine! The bottom line is you have the final authority over what you write. Each critique group member understands that they are just offering suggestions - writing is such a subjective exercise that what may seem correct to one person may seem wrong to the next. You are always free to take advice or leave it.

Sometimes a suggestion will make me mad - "But that's my favorite part!" I may say to myself,

"I can't get rid of that!" But after a day or two, usually, I see the wisdom of the suggestion. Or I change one part and keep the other. Compromise for clarity.

Before I sent poems out to literary magazines and before I published my first chapbook and now as I am preparing my second chapbook, I present every single poem to my Critique Groups (yes - I belong to 2 Poetry Critique Groups! The more the merrier!) Without fail, these friendly juries of my

peers help me hone and improve my work.

Have you noticed? Often in the acknowledgment pages of your favorite contemporary romance, mystery, or history, the author may thank the members of their critique group. Yes - critique groups exist all over the globe and savvy authors rely on them as sounding boards and support for their ideas. They are hip and happening.

WOK has 2 **Poetry** Critique Groups and groups are <u>starting.in</u> the following genres; **Mystery**, **Romance, Young Adult, Children's, Screenplays, SciFi**. Groups meet once or twice a month, in the mornings, afternoons, or evenings, in person or on Zoom.

Send me an email at <u>critiques@writersofkern.com</u> and tell me what genre you write and good days and times for you to attend a meeting. That will start the process! And if two others are interested in your genre, I will set up your Critique Group meeting and guide you through your first sessions.

One more thing - before you invest in having a paid editor examine your work, you should definitely take advantage of Critique Groups! A professional editor is a valuable investment, don't get me wrong. But a Critique Group will help you do most, if not all, of the work a paid editor can offer - for free! What kind of great deal is that?




